# **VISION**

We develop and scale transformative solutions to end human trafficking so that all people can thrive in freedom and dignity.

# **MISSION**

We empower survivors and communities by deploying datadriven programs and solutions that effectively equip the global movement to end human trafficking.





The fight against trafficking is at a critical juncture. In spite of global efforts to curb it, the criminal industry has increased by 22% in just the last 5 years. The world still doesn't have data on what programs are effective in supporting survivors or preventing exploitation. To make progress, we need new solutions. Solutions that are informed by data and survivor voices, and solutions that address the systemic causes of exploitation and re-exploitation.

In 2023, we began piloting new solutions. We launched our social-tech solution, Freedom Lifemap, in 8 locations around the world. For the first time, organizations had the tools to understand the unique strengths and vulnerabilities of survivors, to understand the impact of their existing programs, and to improve their programs to better respond to the direct needs of survivors and those vulnerable to trafficking.

Through our global launch, we've begun identifying local and global trends, and we're uniting frontline responders around the world to respond. We even had the opportunity to present our work to the United Nations.

At the same time, we've continued our direct services supporting survivors of human trafficking. **Our survivor care programs continue to serve the most vulnerable women and children** - including children as young as 4 years old. We launched two new programs designed by survivor leaders in Uganda and the Philippines, and we celebrated the first graduating class of our Freedom First Institute.

There is still so much work to be done. Uganda and the Phillippines continue to be global hotspots for trafficking. Thanks to a generous donor, we acquired land in Uganda and are constructing a world-class Dream Village for child survivors. And in 2024, we are ramping up the scale of Freedom Lifemap across the US and the world.

This work wouldn't exist without the generosity of our incredible community. The impact you see in this report is tangible - it reaches so many lives and has the power to transform the entire fight against human trafficking.

Thank you for joining us in this vision. We are deeply grateful to have you by our side, working together to ensure that every human being is free.



EverFree is on the frontlines to stop trafficking through our signature sites and our innovation partners around the world. As part of our Global Network, innovation partners adapt and apply insights from EverFree's Freedom Lifemap.



## THE FREEDOM LIFEMAP

### Human solutions powered by technology.

In 2023, we launched the Freedom Lifemap tool, the first survivor-led online tool built for survivors and responders, co-created by EverFree co-founder Kelsey Morgan and UCI Blum Center for Poverty Alleviation's Dr. Angela Robinson. The strength-based tool empowers survivors to define their own path to freedom. Responders identify root causes of exploitation, learn what programs are most impactful and effective, and connect survivors with the care they need. EverFree's Global Network of innovation partners implements the Freedom Lifemap tool in trafficking hotspots around the world.



# Highlighting FINANCE, EDUCATION, AND EMPLOYMENT

In 2023, data from EverFree's Freedom Lifemap tool indicated that survivors in Uganda and the Philippines prioritized Finance, Education, & Employment as their greatest need in achieving lasting freedom.

Indeed, in an issue brief addressing vulnerabilities to trafficking, the United Nations Interagency Coordination Group Against Trafficking in Persons recommended strengthening communities by "ensuring trafficked survivors are able to access education, sustainable employment and financial reintegration as part of their recovery and to reduce revictimization."

EverFree's services and programs on the frontlines demonstrate how educational opportunities and financial independence are crucial elements of lasting freedom.

As she donned her graduation dress, one survivor remarked that she could see her whole future ahead.





# Highlighting SURVIVOR VOICES AT THE CENTER

We see freedom the day survivors define it. Survivor voices are at the core of our work, informing our models for aftercare and empowerment. Several survivors have joined as staff members, lending their lived-experience-led insight into our programming. Major initiatives were built and launched through co-creation with survivors and survivor leaders.

The Freedom Lifemap was co-created by a global cohort of survivors who provided their definitions of freedom. Our empowerment programs are informed by client advisory boards led by survivors and vulnerable community members who provide insight into the needs of their communities. The Freedom First Institute at EverFree Uganda was created in collaboration with a survivor advisory committee and equips survivors with vocational, entrepreneurial, and soft skills in a trauma-informed environment. And, this year, at EverFree Philippines, clients formed the KONEK peer support group to foster connection over shared experiences, promoting a wellness model centered on strengths, recovery, and empowerment within a supportive community.




### Revenue Detail \$3,362,346 Total Revenue

# A LETTER FROM JONNA ELECCION, COUNTRY DIRECTOR, EVERFREE PHILIPPINES

Over the years, EverFree Philippines has focused its efforts in providing economic empowerment services to survivors of human trafficking and individuals at-risk for exploitations, mainly for pathways in education and employment. Earning higher education increases a survivor's opportunity to obtain a safe and decent job. In 2023, we opened a new program on entrepreneurship to serve survivors whose childcare and family concerns prevent them from pursuing education or seeking jobs in the formal sector. This new programmatic addition resulted from our core belief that we assist survivors best when we honor their experiences, support their strengths, and listen to their voices.

A survivor once expressed that "Hope is EverFree. Hope is the face of my social worker who never gave up on me, journeyed with me, and made me feel more valuable, when she isn't even my family". This year we served a total of 385 survivors in their journey towards freedom, through direct services in education, employment, entrepreneurship, counseling, case management and crisis intervention support. On top of it, 955 vulnerable individuals received services in job readiness and entrepreneurship training, employment transition, child protection and human trafficking prevention, and basic mental health. The journey of each survivor is not linear, it is not straightforward. While we support them in achieving their career and economic goals, we ensure that they get emotional and psychosocial support through case management, as they navigate the difficult task of finding safe jobs, starting businesses, and continuing basic education.

The year 2024 will focus on sustaining impact, serving more survivors, and reaching more vulnerable groups. We will serve more survivors through expanding partnerships in the implementation of the Freedom Lifemap. We will reach more vulnerable communities through implementing the Survivor-led Prevention and Outreach initiative that aims to capacitate atrisk individuals to prevent sexual and labor exploitation. We will assess risk for human trafficking, identify victims in the community, and connect them to resources to attain freedom. We will structure inclusion of survivor-voices in our processes through amplifying survivor-led solutions and strengthening Client Advisory Board.

### THE PILOT OF MY DESTINY

## An essay by an EverFree scholar

Note from EverFree: Freedom goes beyond rescue. We believe in preventing human trafficking before it takes root by empowering vulnerable communities with scholarships, counseling, and career opportunities. The following story was written by an EverFree scholar (edited for anonymity). He has titled it "The Pilot of My Own Destiny" and describes his journey of hope towards pursuit of his goals, undeterred by the odds.



I grew up in a household where my parents were constantly drunk, witnessing my sister being mistreated by relatives, and being forced to work from a young age, while being physically abused.

It all made life feel incredibly unfair and tough. The most challenging experience of my life was just trying to survive while secretly dreaming of getting an education and living a normal childhood.

I should have been in school, but I had to work instead.

Despite all this, I learned to live with it and grabbed opportunities when they arose. Finally, when I was eight-years-old, I experienced my first day of school, but it was not the happy experience I had hoped for. I felt a sense of emptiness and a lack of belongingness, as I had to learn on my own without guidance or support. This feeling of loneliness and incompleteness persisted throughout my elementary school years. To fill the void, I resorted to inappropriate behavior like being naughty, not listening, and bullying classmates for attention and validation. But even then, I still felt dissatisfied and disappointed. It wasn't until a teacher approached me, praised my abilities, and encouraged me to take on leadership roles that I started to love studying, valuing education, and recalibrating my student lifestyle. I became a student leader, excelled academically, and completed elementary school with flying colors.

In high school, I did my best to prioritize my studies while working to make ends meet. I maintained my status as an honor student, class president, and student government vice president. I decided to pursue an Accountancy Business and Management course during my senior year.

But my life became even more challenging as I had to work early in the morning as a street sweeper, attend to my family responsibilities, and then work a part-time job after school. This left me with only 2-3 hours of sleep each day, which affected my class performance. I would often be late for the first class and struggle to stay awake in the afternoon due to exhaustion.

This took a toll on my health. I lost so much weight, people thought I was abusing drugs due to my appearance. Others assumed and judged a lot about me. But I tried to focus on surviving, I tried to laugh at the challenges. I graduated high school with honors.

College was my next dream— but many obstacles stood in the way of it: working two jobs to support my family, the challenges stemming from the pandemic, how I could manage it all while pursuing my courses.

This is where EverFree Philippines came in. I became an EverFree Scholar, awarded with the opportunity to pursue and finish my education. And my PTI (EverFree Philippines) Counselor helped me learn more about myself and self-improvement. I have realized that my past should not hold me back, but rather serve as a source of strength and inspiration to strive harder in life. Now, my life is much clearer, empowered, and better than before. I am grateful for the opportunities I have received and the progress I have made. This chance to go back to school is essential to me because it is a right that my parents and relatives deprived me of from a young age.

I want to break the chain of limited access to education in my family and prove that despite our situation, I can still pursue my education and obtain a degree. It is a battle I want to win on behalf of my sisters and set an example for them that dreams are possible, regardless of our circumstances.

To all EverFree benefactors, there are no words that can describe how grateful me and my co-scholars are for your kindhearted support. Your generosity has not only given me hope and an opportunity to change my life, but also a direction to rise above my family's situation. I promise to never waste this opportunity and will strive to finish my studies— to never break the chain of goodness I received and to help others in need someday too. May you all receive more blessings to help more dreamers like me who are just waiting for this kind of opportunity and chance to awaken the little dreamer inside. Thank you so much.

### **HOME— FREE AND EVERLASTING**

Haza's\* story of finding hope, freedom, and home with EverFree Uganda.

Haza was 14 years old and in her last year of primary school. It was almost time for exit examinations, but her parents wouldn't let her take them.

"I was in primary seven when a 24-year-old man came to our home and requested my father to give me a hand in marriage. I didn't know my worth, my values and the world outside our home," Haza recalls.

Haza's father said that her husband would educate her, that he would pay for her further schooling, that she would be a happily married woman living a comfortable life. The promise of an education and being cared for was a rare dream for many girls.

But as she began married life, Haza experienced nothing of the sort.

"When I reached my husband's home, the story changed," she recalls. "I was confined to the house; he used to provide food, and other basic needs but he took away all my freedom."

The situation soon took a horrifying turn. "He hid his true identity from me," Haza continues. "He would go away for some good time and come back... I didn't know that he was a terrorist."

As Haza realized that her husband was part of a terrorist rebel group, she learned that her father had been part of the group as well. The whole purpose of her marriage wasn't for her well-being— it was to add to their ranks.

Haza's father began the process of indoctrinating her. He instructed her to harden her heart and distrust everyone but him. He forced her to swear fealty through a ritual covenant.

#### Soon, the rebel forces saw her as one of their own.

For five years, Haza was exploited by the terrorist rebel group. She lived in distrust of everyone but her father and husband.

Earlier this year, Ugandan military intelligence found Haza. They referred her to EverFree Uganda for urgent support.

Haza was in immediate need of safety, medical care, food, and counseling. The abuse left her with hallucinations and painful ulcers. Deeply traumatized by the terror she experienced, Haza refused to eat or sleep and distrusted everyone around her.

"With all the disappointments from different people," Haza says, "I lost trust in every one because even my own people who I trusted misled me."

EverFree staff took Haza to a hospital for urgent medical care. At EverFree's safe home, she started to receive restorative counseling. There she was surrounded by a community of other girls like her. At night she slept safely in her own bed, free from threats of harm and control. She had hot meals and cool water to nourish and refresh her.

#### For the first time, Haza was home.

Now, Haza's story continues as a student at EverFree's Freedom First institute, which empowers survivors of human trafficking with skills and career training in a safe and nurturing space.

"I was empowered with economic skills, soft skills, and trained in catering services and I have developed meaningful values for myself," Haza says.

Looking to start her own business someday, Haza dreams of helping keep her community safe so that other girls like her will be free from trafficking and exploitation.

"If God still blesses me with life, I will sensitize people in my community and I will make sure that I spread information about human trafficking and the different forms of trafficking so that no child is trafficked again."
